Did you know?

A **Curator** is someone who works at a Gallery or Museum. Although a Curator has many different roles, an important part of their job is working with Artists and the Permanent Collection to select artworks/objects to go on exhibition! They often choose artworks/objects and places them together to create an exhibition that shows a specific theme, idea, movement, or cause.

Objective:

At the AGP we have a unique building, and we show art in our sloped hallways, that we call the "Ramps." We're inviting you to create your very own exhibition for our Ramps

What you will need:

- A pencil, pen, crayon or marker
- Colouring pencils, crayons, or markers (something to colour in your exhibition)
- Print out of the Ramp template (next page)

Directions:

On the next page, you will find two empty ramps that you can fill with anything you can imagine! You can fill your ramp gallery with many different paintings, sculptures, or be really creative and create a **site-specific** artwork, like the one that artist Patrick Moore made in 2016!

Fun Fact:

In 2016, artist Patrick Moore (pictured in the grey suit) made a 67-foot long painting of a river. He built his canvases to follow the slopes of the ramp exactly! The work, titled "song of the cataract" made it feel like you were flowing along with the rapids, all the way down the ramp, to the window where you catch a view of Little Lake!
